Session Update – December 20

Session held their last meeting of 2023 on Dec. 11. The meeting was moderated by Rev. Susan Kerr who opened it by reading selected verses from 1 Corinthians 12 and prayer. Our first session meeting for 2024 is scheduled for Monday, Jan. 8, 2024.

- 1. 2023 Financial Update provided by Ron Dekker. On a year-to-date basis (to November month-end), our surplus is slightly over \$13,000. While this is a great position to be in, with a full-time minister we will start to have a monthly deficit, which occurred in both October and November (November actual was a deficit of \$4,054.). The November deficit was a result of lower-than-normal monthly income and some extra expenses. However, given the significant year-to-date surplus from the months when we did not have a full-time minister, we are still forecasting to finish 2023 with a surplus. We encourage everyone to ensure that your givings are up to date.
- 2. Community Christmas Dinner Plans are well under way for the Christmas Dinner and your contributions to this worthwhile initiative are exceeding our expectations! The registration process has started and, if early trends hold, we can expect to have 130-plus people come and enjoy a meal on Christmas Day.
- 3. Not Feeling Well The winter season brings an increased chance of each of us picking up an infectious illness. Out of respect for each other, we ask that, if you are not feeling well, you join us online. That is the best way to ensure illness is not spread here at BEPC.
- 4. Administrative Workload and Succession Planning Applications have been received for the Office Administrator position and the interview process has started. We hope to soon finalize who the successful person is and have them in place by mid-January.
- 5. 2024 BEPC Budget Ron Dekker presented an updated 2024 budget and Session approved it for presentation to, and approval by, the congregation at the Annual General Meeting. When the budget is released in the Annual Report, you will see that it is a deficit budget as we do not anticipate having enough income to cover our expenses. The 2024 deficit will be covered by our accumulated surplus. There will be more details about this in the 2023 Annual Report.
- 6. Annual General Meeting Session agreed that the Annual General Meeting will be held on Sunday March 3, 2024. We will also hold communion on that Sunday.

Session wishes each and everyone a very blessed and peaceful holiday season. We trust and hope that everyone has an opportunity to spend some quality time with family and friends.



The Best Birth Announcement Ever

Isaiah 9:6 – For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (NKJV)

Three days before Christmas, my youngest niece, Bailey, was born. It is a day that I won't forget. It snowed, and for rural middle Georgia, a white Christmas was rare.

She was a beautiful baby with the prettiest eyes. However, I think that most people say that about babies, right?

Part of my job, besides keeping an eye on my niece, Jessica, Bailey's older sister, was to let other people know that Bailey had been born. My sister Tracey had given me a list of people to call and cards to be mailed.

The announcement of the birth of a new baby is important. Cards are sent. Balloons are tied on mailboxes. Normally, there are pictures of the newborn sent along with the announcements. Inside the card, the date of birth, and the measurement and weight of the baby are included.

When Bailey was born, there was no email, no social media, and no quick announcing her birth. There was no skywriting. Instead, I called everyone and mailed out postcards that Tracey had picked out. We tied a pink bow on a tree at my sister's house to let the community know that we had another girl in the family.

Imagine the day when Jesus was born. Remember how God spread the word? God spoke to the shepherds that night through His angel. The shepherds were keeping their sheep in the fields. "Do not be afraid," the angel first told them, and then went on to say, "Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which will be to all people. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10b-11 NKJV)

Of course, the angel didn't include baby Jesus' hair colour, eye colour, weight, or measurement in inches. But we found out so much more.

This baby was going to be the Lord of their lives. Whoa! And not just their lives, but our lives, too.

With the birth of Baby Jesus, the announcement was that the Saviour was here. Back then, and with us now, too, people had the need for someone who would bring them back at rights with God. They had turned to wrong living and straying off the right path, and nothing else was the answer to forgiving their sins and bringing them back to God. The same goes for us when we stray.

Nothing else could connect them to God except the sinless blood of the same person whom the baby Jesus grew up to be: Christ the Lord, the Saviour.

So, the angel told them: Here is your answer — the Christ is here. He is born, and with Him, redemption is possible. The same message is for us. Let us accept this gracious offer of forgiveness!

Talk about the best birth announcement ever!

Prayer: Dear Lord, the announcement of Your Son's birth brought great joy. What an amazing gift He is for us. Thank You for loving us so much. Amen.
