Easter

How are you doing?

I hope you are OK. It's a bit of a weird winter — or a season that's not really a winter because we haven't had much snow yet (knock on wood, I'm not missing snow shovelling!). We're in a season of uncertainty when interest rates are supposed to come down but they might not yet, in a time when we're filing income taxes and seeing what the government will do, but we don't know yet.... There's a lot of now and not yets. While that seems pretty normal these days, we wonder where it will all lead us.

Last month we talked about the journey of Lent – a journey we will continue through March until Holy Week, which falls this year from March 24-31. And, as we said last month, a journey is not just wandering – it has a destination. These weeks of Lent take us into a whole lot of 'not yets' on the way to that destination – the moment when God, in Jesus Christ, shows that nothing in the universe can stop the love and life of God.

Here's some of what happens:

- Jesus enters Jerusalem as a hero, but he's not where he needs to be yet.
- The people herald him and it seems that things are going well, but they aren't ready
 to accept everything he's telling them not yet.
- Those in power at the time, religious leaders and political officials, know they have
 to deal with this upstart preacher who is saying that the poor are blessed, but they
 can't move against the overwhelming tide of public opinion in His favour not yet.
- God's grace and love have been shown all the way along through Jesus' ministry, but He's about to show them what love and power truly mean but not yet.

But it's coming. God's love and power are coming into reality through Jesus' death on a cross and resurrection. Through love and power, suffering and hurt, these events show us that God will do anything to bring us into right relationships with God and with each other again.

It's confusing sometimes – that moment when the now and the 'not yet's' suddenly become reality and we're face to face with what we were waiting for all along. We're seeing what it means when this journey reaches its destination. We see what God will do, and has done for love. For you. For me. For the world. What will we do with that in our faith, in our lives, in the way we treat one another. How will we live this message and this hope made real?

Come with us as we complete the journey of Lent in worship, study, and our Lenten lunch series. Then come with us as we enter into the deep, difficult sometimes, joyful sometimes, awesome and inspiring journey of Holy Week. On our journey there are destination points: a supper with friends, a parade, a cross, and an empty tomb. Because God's love, power and grace in Jesus Christ aren't a 'not yet' moment any more. They are here. Now. God is calling you and me to LIFE!

And so our new journey begins.

- New security cameras for the side parking lot and the sanctuary exit. Fire exit signs have been modified in Douglas Hall. Land Acknowledgement plaques have been installed (see below).

Carly Montgomery has just released her first-ever single, *Just So You Know*, and has generously made it a fundraiser, with all proceeds going to UNITED24, a charity launched by the president of Ukraine a few months after the invasion began.

Carly, 17, is the daughter of Lesley (a member of our choir) and Don Montgomery, and granddaughter of Dorothy Fabian, longtime member of Pineland and BEPC. Carly collaborated on the song with Aleksiia Medianyk, 19, who arrived in Canada last year after fleeing the war. They met at school and have become good friends.

The song expresses Aleksiia's thoughts and experiences during a devastating time for her, her family, and her country. They wrote the song together and Carly performed and produced it.

Carly's music teacher wrote, "The first time I heard it, it floored me, with the first-hand experience of war and leaving home articulated so well through the eyes of a teen. It's an important piece that deserves to be heard."

We acknowledge with gratitude and respect that Burlington East Presbyterian Church is located on/in the traditional territory of Anishinaabe. Haudenosaunce, Attiwandaron, and Missisaugas of the Credit First Nation peoples. This territory is covered by Treaty 3 3/4 and Brant Track Treaty 8.

I Have So Much To Thank God For!

Psalm 77:11-12 - I will remember the works of the Lord; Surely I will remember Your wonders of old. I will also meditate on all Your work, and talk of Your deeds. (NKJV)

I will try to do just that as I retell the story so often repeated by my parents when I was growing up.

Polio is a highly contagious, disabling, and life-threatening disease that can infect a person's spinal cord, causing paralysis. At its peak in the 1940s and 1950s, polio would paralyze or kill over half a million people worldwide every year.

In July, 1946, at two years of age, I was a patient at Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto, Canada, and was not expected to survive the disease that ravaged my little body. My parents were thoroughly exhausted, as my father visited the hospital every morning and both my father and mother would visit the hospital every evening, even though they were never allowed to see me, because I was in isolation. Several agonizing months went by.

After what must have seemed like an eternity, they visited an interdenominational church in Toronto. With standing room only, it must have been overwhelming for them, to say the least.

A very kind pastor noticed the couple in obvious distress and cautiously approached them with the comment, "My name is Pastor Smith. Can I help you?" My father often said that it was almost as if he were waiting for them to show up. Right there in the lobby, he placed his arms around them and prayed for them and me, with the promise that he would also call on the huge congregation to pray later in the service.

During the service, true to his word, Pastor Oswald J. Smith, who founded the People's Church in Toronto in 1928, stopped the singing. He called for prayer for little two-year-old Stephen French, who was not expected to survive a terrible disease called polio. That was almost 80 years ago.

On Monday morning, my father visited the Sick Children's Hospital on his way to work as usual. When he arrived at the hospital entrance, he was rather shocked to see a doctor running towards him, waving his arms and shouting, "It's a miracle! It's a miracle! Come quickly and see your son." The curtain was pulled back to reveal a little boy sitting up in bed for the first time in months and obviously very much alive.

Would you wonder why, at the age of 12, I would accept the gift from the Lord Jesus Christ to be my personal Saviour from sin and accept the call to preach the gospel for the rest of my life?

Psalm 9:1 - I will praise You, O Lord, with my whole heart; I will tell of all Your marvelous works. (NKJV)

What has God done in your life that should cause you to tell of all His marvellous works? We can use even small "coincidences" to give glory to God!

Prayer: Our Father, we have so much to thank You for that our lives won't be long enough to do it adequately. Thank You for all who are made clean by the blood of Your Son Jesus Christ and who are called by You to listen to the cry of the human heart and to respond. Amen!

Worth repeating: Why go to Church?

A Church goer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper saying it made no sense to go to church every Sunday. He wrote: "I've gone for 30 years and in that time I've heard something like 3,000 sermons. For the life of me, I can't remember a single one. I think I'm wasting my time and the preachers and priests are wasting theirs."

This started a real controversy in Letters to the Editor. Much to the delight of the editor, it went on for weeks until someone wrote this clincher:

"I've been married for 30 yea(rs now. In that time my wife has cooked some 32,000 meals. For the life of me, I cannot recall the entire menu for a single one, but I do know this: They all nourished me and gave me the strength I needed to do my work. If my wife had not given me these meals, I would be physically dead today. Likewise, if I had not gone to church for nourishment, I would be spiritually dead."

When you are DOWN to nothing, God is UP to something.

Faith sees the invisible, believes the incredible & receives the impossible! Thank God for our physical and spiritual nourishment!
